## Website

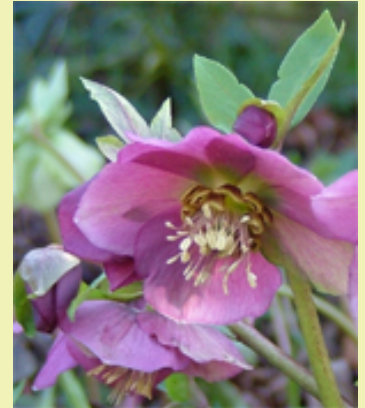
We have finally completed our website updates, which included the addition of thousands of images, updated plant descriptions and listings.

This was a major undertaking and we hope you like the results. There are still several image gaps, mainly due to adding around **150 new varieties** to our collection last autumn. Where we have gaps on the variety pages, we link to the Hosta Library home page - so you can search that site for images.

More excitingly, out of these 150 new varieties we will have sales stock for more than 50, but quite a few will be limited in quantity. To browse the full list - see our **2011 Availability** page, where varieties that are new and/or in limited supply, are highlighted. All available varieties are listed in our 2011 Catalogue, which you can download from our website, or order from us - **find out more**.

## Plant Heritage

The theme for the 2011 Show is **'A Living Library of Garden Plants'** featuring the widest range of National Collections ever to be showcased at the Show.

## Looking forward...

The nursery is springling into life already.



Robin and Mel selected plants to 'pull forward' for our first show, Harrogate Spring. This year the show is a full week earlier than last year. Given the lateness of the spring in 2010, the last thing they expected to see was several plants already breaking dormancy, in the shade tunnel so early. We break dormancy using a miniature tunnel, within Tunnel 2, equipped with a heated bench and supplemental lighting. As soon as the shoots are through sufficiently, we move them out to 'harden off'.

Although, some of the usual suspects are already through in the poly-tunnels, the furthest forward is **h. 'Venus Star'** - opposite.

This variety is in Tunnel 3, which had no cover during the coldest weather we had this winter. Going through the shade tunnel, which only has a single layer of netting, and Tunnel 3, it was very interesting to see how these plants are further forward than those in the covered tunnels. The uncovered and netted areas may have been colder, but they have also been the first to 'warm up' afterwards. Since Christmas the weather in East Anglia has been more spring-like with less penetrating frosts, although light levels have been low. We are wondering if the plants are emerging earlier because the worse of the weather came earlier than usual. Whatever the reason, seeing these green shoots is hugely encouraging, and heralds the start of our 2011 season.

**Don't forget: treat early for pests** and apply feed to pot-grown plants.
